## **'Not just a railway village'**

How much of the history of Colwall can be seen in its landscape? There are villages in England that have moved once, or even twice, but not many settlements have moved three times as Colwall has. The final move towards the railway is a small part of a history going back through medieval times to the Iron Age.

At our next meeting Dr James Ferguson will be giving an illustrated talk about the early history of Colwall as shown in the landscape. He first began to appreciate how much evidence there is from walking around the parish. When the Village Society was formed he volunteered to produce a set of walks to develop historical interest in Colwall and several of these have since been published as 'Discovery Walks' by the Malvern Hills Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty.

Dr Ferguson continues to spend a lot of time walking the parish and its surroundings. If you have a Parish Footpath map you may find it useful to bring it with you to refer to after the talk.

Admission is free for members, £2 for visitors. There will be refreshments afterwards.

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## **Churchyard recording complete**

On 1st September a small group from the Herefordshire Family History Society, helped by 2 local residents, completed the recording of monumental inscriptions in the churchyard up to the end of 1949. It has taken 6 visits over a period of 3 years – several quiet afternoons on hands and knees reading the stones in the company of a few little frogs and rather more ants from the occasional anthill. The records will now be typed and checked before being produced on CD in about a year's time.

## **For the record – Colwall railway bridge**

In August 2005 we noted that the road bridge over the railway was narrowed to one lane, and permanent traffic lights installed for the first time in Colwall. On 15 August 2007 the bridge was completely closed following an inspection by Herefordshire Council which raised safety concerns. It was opened for pedestrians only on 5th September, the first day of term at Colwall CE Primary School.

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## **From the Archive**

### **The old organ at the Wyche Free Church**

*From a pamphlet written by Ken Gaines, one of the Elders of the church who has worked for the famous organ firm of Nicholsons.*

The organ was built in its present form in 1924 by Rest Cartwright of London as a 'stock job' (parts of older organs). It appears to have been based mainly on an organ built around 1878 by Trustam & Son of Bedford who seem to have used an even earlier soundboard – now estimated to be approximately 200 years old. It was supplied in 1924 to Farnborough Gospel Mission, whose choirmaster noticed it while on a visit to the Empire Exhibition at Wembley. An electric blower was fitted in 1951 and the organ received a cleaning and light overhaul in 1967.

It was acquired by Wyche Free Church in 1982. A thorough overhaul in 1995 included repair to the pipework, refurbishment of the action and soundboard renovation. The tonal qualities and neat appearance of this small organ have been appreciated by discerning experts.

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### Milkmen in Colwall

Today there are two large dairies offering doorstep delivery, and supplies of milk in plastic bottles at the village shop. Fifty years ago fresh milk from working farms was delivered all around the village by many different milkmen. This list was kindly supplied by Les Hughes.
